

President's Message - Charlie Sell

A year may be a blip on the calendar of life but not at Dolphin Cay! The maintenance staff and outside contractors have been busy maintaining and improving our beautiful property.

Let's take a tour together on one of our "almost" new electric maintenance vehicles. As we pass through the gatehouse, we notice the much needed face-lift it received. The project started with power washing, then painting, adding new pavers, lighted gate bars and a bright new awning, complete with the Dolphin Cay logo. We're sure that everyone appreciates the fresh look.

Continuing on our drive, we notice that the bromeliad garden has been mulched and thinned to stimulate flowering. Not much further until we are at the tennis court area. The courts invite you to grab your racket and play! You'll notice the new court resurfacing and lines to keep your tennis experience a positive one.

On the way to the casino you can't miss the charging stations, installation covered by Duke Energy at no cost to us. We will of course keep a flexible parking policy for resident use in balance with station demand. But charging stations are a true investment in maintaining value and appeal of Dolphin Cay to current and future residents.

Moving along, you notice that the Fitness Center and Casino seem brighter. They were not only repainted but any leaks were fixed, tiles repaired, and any weathered wood replaced. The Casino front and rear doors were showing their age and were also replaced. To complete the picture, walk back to the adult pool and see the pagoda and walls that have all been repaired and painted. The ever popular hot tub on your right also received a new Marcite lining and heater.

To your left is our Community Library, with not only new tables, bookshelves and sign-in and drop-off cabinet but also many new and popular titles. Our hardworking library volunteers ensure that it continues to be a property hit, as is its cross-pool neighbor, the Fitness Center.

Oh, did I mention our feathered winter visitors are back at Spoonbill Lake, their winter home of choice? We have already over 200 visitors – the No Vacancy sign goes out at 500! (Although at times, many don't read it.) In the summer we had another unwelcome lake guest and had to hire a trapper to remove the alligator. It took some time before our resident ducks really believed it was safe again to enter the water!

Strolling around the lake, it's hard not to notice that the bollard lights on the property have been freshly repainted. The steps and walls leading from the water into the lake at the royal palm circle have also been repaired and repainted.



Walking on towards the beach pool, a dying Sylvester date palm was replaced on the north side of the promenade and we are actively monitoring the health of those remaining and will treat as needed.

At the end of the promenade you'll see the three newly repaired and repainted gazebo structures. The pool chairs were repainted and the mesh was replaced. We also have a program to regularly groom the beach and it's looking much better.

Speaking of our pools and feathered residents, if you were here during the summer, you know we had a problem with ducks swimming in the pools. During this we worked closely with the Health Department and cleaned the pools with increased frequency. After many trial solutions to include coyote decoys and floating beach balls, we solved the problem with the almost invisible lines strung across the beach pool.

Our last stop takes us by the more manageable Butterfly Garden, where the butterflies are coming back. Plans are in place to make them feel even more welcome.

This tour of our property highlights many of the things we have done in 2019 and the ongoing commitment that your Master Board and I have to maintain and enhance our property.

Community Association Manager - Ryan Howard, LCAM

Every March we have our Annual Association and Master Board meetings for Dolphin Cay.

During the Master Board meeting, we have the membership vote on performing an audit and carrying over any excess funds. This year we will have an extra question on all sub-association proxies about fire alarm sounders.

All five sub-associations know that elevator modernization will be needed in the next few years. If we want to upgrade, the Fire Marshall has required us to add sounders that will provide 75 decibels in each bedroom at Dolphin Cay.

It is not a guarantee, but we have been advised to have a membership vote and if we can show 80% to 90% of the community does **not want** sounders, the Fire Marshall may reconsider the requirement since the code gives him full discretion. The cost of this project will be at least \$55,000 and has potential change orders that could reach \$100,000 PER BUILDING.

Even if you ignore the cost, these sounders must be hardwired from the 1st floor electrical room and run throughout the building. Once they enter your unit from your dryer vents, you will be required to be home during the entire installation. We estimate each building will take months to complete and will require a coordinated effort of all residents, Board members, and staff.

Over the next 45 days, please be on the lookout for these proxies in the mail. If you live in a condo, **you will receive two**: one proxy from your association and another proxy for the DCPOA.

If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to speak to one of your Board members or contact me at the office. I am happy to discuss this issue with anyone.



Now...About Our Migratory Birds

People around the world contribute their bird observations to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology each year. Some of our residents participate in these observations on Dolphin Cay helping trace bird migration, nesting success, and changes in bird numbers to conserve birds and their habitats.

A Corps of Engineers contracted shore bird monitor and photographer informs us that Spoonbill Lake has become the winter home of choice for all of the Redheads in Pinellas County. They roost in the lake during the day and feed in the bay overnight.

The duck pictured here top and center is a relatively rare Canvasback. Notice the beak which tapers from the head - like a door stop. Unlike the clean white back of the Canvasback, the male Redhead with its full round "Charlie Brown" head has a light gray back.

Committee & Organization Reports

Architectural Review Committee - Cliff Allen

All residents must submit a Request for Improvements form to the ARC for approval before a project starts in order to uphold standards of safety, structural integrity, appearance, and conformity. The Forms cover a range of improvement tasks and are obtained from the office and sample forms are found in the Resident Information Forms section of the Resident information Packet, or online at www.dolphincay.com under Homeowner Info.

To expedite the ARC assessment of your Request for Improvement for all projects, please provide as much detail as possible on changes to be made, the location affected, engineering diagrams if available, and brochure specifics about materials to be used. In the case of condominium floor coverings, a sample of the covering and underlayment must be provided to the Office.

A Word about Window/Slider/Shutter Installations:

This is the time of the year when residents start thinking about replacing windows and/or shutters before the hurricane season begins. Here are a few guidelines to keep in mind before getting started.

- ✓ Make sure the company you choose knows that the windows must match the old windows in appearance.
- The installation is the most critical part. You might ask if the company has their own crew or do they contract out. This could make a difference if there is a problem with the installation.

- ✓ Lifetime warranty: Only good as long as the company is still in business. Choose a company that is reliable and one that has been in business for a while. This is not a guarantee they will stay in business, just a better chance.
- Keep in mind your neighbors, who may be impacted by your job, especially those with an open deck below you. You may require their permission.

One last note. The ARC and the Management Office does not like to recommend a person, a company or a product, although if we are aware of a problem we will pass that information to you. The best recommendations come from your neighbors.

Landscaping Committee

The fall/winter flower bed changes were completed throughout the community along with the annual replenishment of mulch. General maintenance, trimming and weeding continue weekly as crews move from common areas, single family homes, condominiums and other buildings. There are numerous palms and other trees that are trimmed during scheduled months and as needed. Irrigation teams also come routinely to check and repair the sprinkler systems. The sod was recently treated so there are areas of browning you may notice along the lake, buildings and other common areas. ProCare frequently monitors sod conditions, identifying, treating or replacing sod in affected areas as necessary. Although we live in a warm climate, the seasons still bear plenty of changes in the landscape, some subtle, others more noticeable.



Fall and winter are the seasons for several types of sod diseases, fungus and insects. The sugarcane mosaic virus is one that's been active in southern Pinellas County on and off for several years. Brown patch fungus or TARR (Take-all-root rot) are other turf issues, along with grubs which feed on grass roots. ProCare identified a of couple areas affected by the sugarcane virus and has been treating them. Once they do recognize an issue, immediate action is taken in treating the area(s) and the necessary steps to suppress the disease or eradicate the problems are performed.

The Sylvester date palm replaced along the promenade walkway in January 2019 is doing well. Unfortunately, there is another palm in distress. ProCare sent a sample to the University of Florida's Plant Diagnostic Center and confirmed it was the same Lethal Bronzing Disease (LBD used to be called Texas Phoenix Palm Decline (TPPD) disease). ProCare has already begun to treat it and will monitor the progress over the next couple of months and the arborist will keep the Master Board informed as to its condition and options for the health of the other palms. It's a fairly new palm disease with not a lot of historical data or recovery results; time will tell. It doesn't develop from the soil but is transmitted by insects; those suspected to be the carriers are plant-hoppers, psyllids or treehoppers.

February through March is invasive plant removal time. That's when ProCare removes the invasives such as Brazilian red pepper, carrotwood and other select species. The invasives typically grow in the same areas and spread without difficulty, but can be identified easily. During the Antiqua/Bermuda mangrove trim recently, trim crews worked hard to remove a massive thorny vine plant which had invaded the north end. This unfortunately resulted in an untidy trim. ProCare will work to remove the core of the invasive with special equipment in the near future. It was also discovered by the kayak area, but luckily, they're smaller plants and requests to remove them have been submitted.

A lot of effort goes into maintaining the grounds and making the landscape beautiful. It's not always perfect and nature brings plenty of issues to contend with. Hopefully you enjoy the scenery and appreciate all the effort that makes Dolphin Cay a beautiful and unique community.

The deadline for declaring or changing one's affiliation is February 18.


There will be important municipal and State candidates on the March ballot as well as Local financial referendum.




